This book isn't about just the environment; it's about a world of possibility in science, labor, love, and money. It's about that terrible, subtle tragedy of people who destroy what they say they want to save by a greed they cannot see. Though it is a global story, it starts at that place I call home.

Natural Process: That Environmental Laws May Serve the Laws of Nature

- An economy is too complex to be run by central planning. So, why do we have a government monopoly managing the environment?
- The power to regulate is the power to control the economy. That kind of power invites corruption.
- Bureaucracies get **more** funding when problems worsen. Then why are we putting nature on welfare?
- What if there was competition among businesses managing natural processes for profit?
- How would it work? Who would keep it honest?
- Can't the existing regulatory system be fixed? Is it really that big a problem?

This book introduces a free-market environmental management system that gradually eliminates the need for permits, regulations, and agency enforcement. Its design starts with proven product-design and manufacturing process-control techniques used to assure consumer product quality and safety. These components are incorporated into a system of checks and balances that uses third party certification and pooled risk to price the use of natural assets objectively while protecting private property rights. It can improve our care of the environment in harmony with an advanced economy.

This five-part work shows how regulatory government operates under false premises, leaving agencies dependent upon continuing problems, incapable of balancing competing risks, and subject to corrupt influences. The book makes its case with detailed analyses of original source data that reveal a new way to do better for nature. It proposes specific examples and suggests an effective implementing strategy. It is a thought-provoking work that handles an emotional subject with a delightful sense of humor.

Mark Edward Vande Pol brings a diverse background to the field of environmental management. His experience includes hands-on research in habitat restoration, machine design, manufacturing electronics and medical devices, software development, pest control, formulation and compatibility testing, design of experiments, industrial and residential construction, regulatory compliance, quality system design, vendor qualification, and documentation control. His university education is founded in control system mathematics, economics, and Constitutional philosophy. He combines that experience with the drive and commitment, characteristic of product creators, and the respect for working people derived from having done the hard work with his own hands.

Mark was a leading participant in the Santa Cruz County Local Agenda 21 Biodiversity and Ecosystem Management Roundtable. His purpose was to see rigorous science respected in policy. The final document, presented as "consensus," was rewritten in secret by non-participants. It was a fraud.

That did it. Mr. Vande Pol halted his career and spent three years without pay, researching the causes of environmental mismanagement and developing a free-market alternative. Reading it carefully will forever change the way you see private property, free enterprise, and individual liberty in improving environmental health.
